Digital Scrapbooking Mastery, No. 2 Lesson 8: Frayed Herringbone Ribbon for Adobe Photoshop Manual © 2019 Jen White

Not to worry, we're not going to let your fancy herringbone pattern sit. In this lesson you'll use your pattern to create a realistically woven ribbon with frayed ends. You'll have to look twice to make sure it's not real.

- Begin in Adobe Photoshop.
- Open the document (File > Open) you ended with after putting your Mastery 2 scrapbook page together at the end of Lesson 6.
- Press the letter D to reset the Color Chips to the default of black over white.
- In the Layers panel, hide all groups. To do that, click on their Visibility icon.
- Click on the topmost hidden group to activate it.
- In the Menu Bar, choose View and place a checkmark next to Rulers to turn them on.

Create a Ribbon Base

• Get the Rectangular Marquee tool.

- In the Tool Options, click on the New Selection icon. Set the Feather to 0 and the Style to Normal.
- On the document, click and drag a selection outline that's approximately 1 inch tall and 12 inches wide. To reposition while dragging, hold down the Space bar.



- In the Layers panel, click on the Create a New Layer icon.
- Double click on the name of the new layer and rename it Ribbon Base.
- Press Alt Backspace (Mac: Opt Delete) to fill the selection with black.
- Press Ctrl D (Mac: Cmd D) to deselect.
- Press Ctrl T (Mac: Cmd T) to get the Transform options.
- In the Tool Options, set the Width to 80%. Click the checkmark to commit.



Add Varied Edges

- In the Menu Bar, choose Filter > Distort > Ripple.
- In the dialog box, set the Amount to 40 and the Size to Large. Click OK.



- Get the Rectangular Marquee tool.
- On the document, click and drag a selection outline around the right end of the ribbon. Leave plenty of room to work.
- In the Menu Bar, choose Filter > Liquify.
- In the dialog box, hold down the Ctrl key (Mac: Cmd key) and click Default.
- Get the Bloat tool. Set the Size to 225. Click and drag from the outer boundaries of the preview area toward the ribbon to distort the end so that it looks unevenly cut. To undo a step, press Ctrl Z (Mac: Cmd Z).
- Get the Pucker tool. Set the Size to 225. Click and hold down the mouse outside the boundaries of the ribbon to draw the edges out and create an additional uneven look.
- Click OK to commit the changes.
- On the document, click and drag the selection outline to the left end of the ribbon base.
- In the Menu Bar, choose Filter > Liquify.
- Distort and click OK.
- Press Ctrl D (Mac: Cmd D) to deselect.

Add Frayed Edges

- In the Layers panel, click on the Create a New Layer icon.
- Double click directly on the name of the new layer and rename it Fray.
- Hold down the letter Z and click to zoom into left end of the ribbon.
- Get the Brush tool.
- In the Tool Options, open the Brush Picker and choose a Hard Round brush from the General Brushes. Set the Size to 6, the Mode to Normal, the Opacity to 100%, and the Flow to 100%. Click on the Brush panel icon to toggle it open.
- In the Brush Panel, under Brush Tip Shape, uncheck all options. Set the Spacing to 106. Close the Brush panel.
- On the document, click and drag back and forth (like scribbling) to create fray.



- On the document, hold down the Space bar and click and drag to reposition the zoom to the right end of the ribbon base.
- Add fray to that end.
- In the Layers panel, hold down the Shift key and click on the Ribbon Base layer. Now two layers should be active.
- Click on the Create New Group icon.
- Double click directly on the name of the new group and rename it Ribbon Template.

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Add a Layer Style

- In the Menu Bar, choose Layer > Layer Style > Bevel & Emboss.
- In the dialog box, set the Style to Inner Bevel, the Technique to Smooth, the Depth to 53, the Direction to Up, the Size to 3, and the Soften to 0.
- Click on Drop Shadow. Set the Blend Mode to Multiply, the Opacity to 50, the Angle to 120, the Distance to 8, the Spread to 0, and the Size to 7. Click OK.



Add a Color

- In the Layers panel, click on the arrow to open the Ribbon Template group.
- Holding down the Ctrl key (Mac: Cmd key) click on the thumbnail of the Ribbon Base layer to get a selection outline.
- Holding down Shift Ctrl (Mac: Shift Cmd) click on the thumbnail of the Fray layer to add to the selection outline.
- Click on the arrow to close the Ribbon Template group.
- Click on the Add New Fill or Adjustment Layer icon and choose Solid Color.
- In the Swatches panel, choose a darker color from your swatches or choose a dark neutral color from the Color Picker. I'm using Hex #282828. Click OK to close the Color Picker.
- In the Layers panel, change the Blend Mode to Screen.



Add Varied Texture

- In the Layers panel, click on the Create a New Layer icon.
- Double click directly on the name of this new layer and rename it Clouds.
- In the Menu Bar, choose Filter > Render > Clouds.
- In the Layers panel, holding down the Alt key (Mac: Opt key) click and drag a duplicate layer mask from the Color Fill layer to the Clouds layer.
- In the Layers panel, set the Opacity to 5%. This percentage will vary depending on the colors you're using for your ribbon.



Add the Herringbone Pattern

- In the Layers panel, click on the Add New Fill or Adjustment Layer icon and choose Pattern.
- In the dialog box, open the Pattern Picker and choose the Herringbone pattern.

NOTE: If you don't see the Herringbone pattern, open the flyout menu and choose Load Patterns. Navigate to the Mastery2-Herringbone.pat file you saved in the last lesson and click Open. The pattern should now appear at the bottom of the Pattern Picker.

- In the dialog box, set the Scale to 200 and check Link With Layers. Click OK.
- To reposition the pattern, get the Move tool and then click and drag on the document.
- In the Layers panel, hold down the Alt key (Mac: Opt key) and click and drag a copy of the layer mask from the Color Fill layer to the Pattern Fill layer.



• In the Layers panel, click on the Add New Fill or Adjustment Layer icon and choose Solid Color.

- In the Color Picker, choose white and click OK.
- In the Menu Bar, choose Layer > Create Clipping Mask.
- In the Layers panel, change the Blend Mode to Screen.
- Double click on the thumbnail of the Color Fill layer to open the Color Picker.
- On the document, click to sample the color behind the white pattern.
- In the Color Picker, choose a lighter version of that color. I'm using Hex #404040. Click OK.



Create a Final Group

- In the Layers panel, the Color Fill layer should be active.
- Holding down the Shift key, click on the Ribbon Template group. Now all parts of the ribbon should be active.
- Click on the Create a New Group icon.
- Double click directly on the name of the new group and rename it Frayed Herringbone Ribbon.

Add the Ribbon to Your Mastery2 Scrapbook Page

- Press Ctrl 0 (Mac: Cmd 0) to zoom out.
- In the Layers panel, click on the Visibility icon of the hidden groups to reveal them.
- The Herringbone Ribbon group should still be active.
- Get the Move tool.
- On the document, click and drag the ribbon to the middle of the document and position it so it is just peeking in from the left side.

TIP: Make sure to leave room for the journaling we'll add later. I have that space indicated by a red box below.



- On the document, hold down Shift Alt (Mac: Shift Opt) and click and drag a duplicate ribbon to right side of the page.
- Let go of the Alt key (Mac: Opt key), but continue holding down the Shift key and click and drag again to position the ribbon so it's directly across from the first ribbon but peeking out from the right side the page.

Save the Document

• Save the document (File > Save).
