

Chima Ifediora

At seven, Chima is the youngest child of Aunty Ifeoma and the younger brother of Amaka and Obiora. He is also the cousin of Kambili and Jaja. He is in primary school.

His name Chima means 'God knows best.'

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Aunty Ifeoma cites Chima's inability to tell Kambili's name as reason for Chief Eugene to allow Kambili and Jaja visit her in Nsukka. According to her, 'Chima, does not even know Kambili's name.'

Physical description of Chima

- When Father Amadi visited the Ifidiora's as he discussed with children, he spoke to Chima about the 'neighborhood video game.'
- He falls asleep easily.

Quote:

'Chima had fallen asleep on the sofa' before prayers.'

• He cried when Chief Eugene came to pick up Kambili and Jaja, but he broke into a smile when his mother was handed some money by Chief Eugene to buy him sweets.

Quote:

'Chima started to cry; I knew he did not want Jaja to leave...Instead to make Chima feel better, he said, 'o zugo, it's enough," hugged Chima, and stuffed a small wad of naira notes into Aunty Ifeoma's hand to buy Chima a present, which made Chima smile.'

 He constantly did what his mother told him not to do because he was very playful.

Quote:

'He was in the garden, doing something on his knees, too, although Aunty Ifeoma often told him "Kwusia, don't do that" or "If you do that again, I will give you a knock."

 His innocence is displayed in the ease with which he laughed.

Quote:

'Mommy! I want the chicken leg,' Chima said.

 When his mother mentioned that Jaja's namesake, 'Jaja of Opobo' was exiled from Nigeria because of his defiance and his refusal to acquiesce to the British government, he remarked,

Ouote:

"That's sad. Maybe he should not have been defiant."

 He also spoke about the tortoise's cracked shell to Papa-Nnukwu.

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'Chima chortled. "The tortoise has a cracked shell!"

- 5. Chima was also very inquisitive.

Quote:
