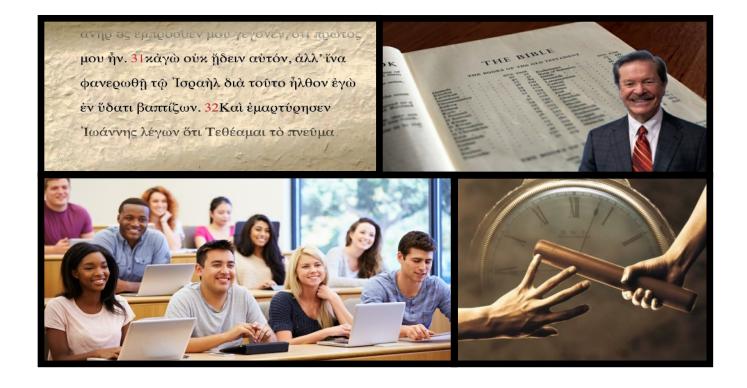

INTRODUCTION

This is because most churches are skilled at generating religious excitement but are poor at discipling, training, and grounding believers in the things of God. The result is a church that is a mile wide and an inch deep, a church in which people do not know what they believe, a church that is easy prey for the religious vultures of our time.

This need to know what non-Christian religions believe is all the more dire if the Church is to go on the offensive. It is not just ignorance of the gospel that binds the unsaved. They are bound by religions that the Kingdom of Darkness has offered them to fill a religious void but with emptiness. If we are going to storm the bastions of our enemies, we must know their arsenal.

We must also know the false religions of our time if we are going to understand what makes the world as it is. We are not called to simply exist in the world; we are called to change it. We are called to liberate the captives, transform the nations, and reform the institutions of men according to God's word. This means we must be like the men of Issachar "who understood the times and knew what Israel should do..." (1 Chronicles 12:32).

We are living in days that promise more victory for the gospel on earth than ever before. The demons rage because they are losing their grip. Entire nations are about to be set free. And you are part of that victory. Learn then, not just to pass a course, but to deliver the lost, disciple the nations, and return to God what cost Him the blood of his Son.

THE INSTRUCTOR

Stephen Mansfield, Ph.D.

Stephen Mansfield believes that life ought to be lived passionately, adventurously and on a large scale. His manner of living certainly reflected this philosophy and it has made him the writer, the statesman, and the educator that he is.

Stephen was born in 1958 to a military family and grew up largely in Europe due to his father's work as an intelligence officer in the United States Army. After a youth filled with sports, travel, and mischief, Stephen was recruited to play college football but turned down the opportunity when a religious conversion moved him to attend a Christian college.

After majoring in history and philosophy, he moved to Texas where he pastored a church, earned several master's degrees, hosted a radio show and founded a nationwide network of agencies serving the poor. He moved to Tennessee in 1991 where he again pastored a church, worked extensively in Middle East politics, and completed a doctorate. It was during this time that he also began writing books. His first book on Winston Churchill was a Gold Medallion Award Finalist. He also wrote biographies of Booker T. Washington and George Whitefield as well as a number of other books on history and leadership.

In 2002, Stephen left the pastorate to write and lecture full-time while continuing to exert influence on the American political scene. It was during this time that he wrote *The Faith of George W. Bush*, which spent many weeks on the New York Times bestseller list and has been credited with profoundly shaping public discourse on religion in America.

Stephen is becoming one the nation's most sought after commentators and lecturers on matters of faith, politics, and American culture. He has founded Mansfield Group to answer the pressing needs of leading organizations for education that explains the times and the trends that define the future. He has also founded Chartwell Literary Group, a network of writers, researchers, and artists who help leaders impact culture through books and literature.

His latest books are *The Faith of the American Soldier* and *Benedict XVI: His Life and Mission*. Both have been released to widespread acclaim.

When he is not writing or lecturing, Stephen feeds his addiction to racquetball and a good laugh with friends over something wonderful to eat. His lifestyle is testimony to this maxim: "Live every day as thought it were your last, for one day you are sure to be right."
