Lesson 1 - What is the Bible?

Scripture is the ______ divinely inspired writings, consisting of the 66 books of the Old and New Testaments, which in their original languages are the only divinely authoritative source and rule for knowing God and His salvation.

What this means is that as Christians we believe that God has ______ Himself to us.

"God, who at various times and in various ways spoke in time past to the fathers by the prophets, has **in these last days spoken to us by His Son**, whom He has appointed heir of all things, through whom also He made the worlds; who being the brightness of His glory and **the express image of His person**, and upholding all things by the word of His power, when He had by Himself purged our sins, sat down at the right hand of the Majesty on high," **(Heb 1:1-3)**

"He was clothed with a robe dipped in blood, and His name is called The Word of God." **(Rev 19:13)**

CLAIMS THE BIBLE MAKES ABOUT ITSELF:

The Bible claims that... both the Old and New Testaments came into being as the Spirit of ______ testified through people.

"Of this salvation the prophets have inquired and searched carefully, who prophesied of the grace that would come to you, 11 searching what, or what manner of time, **the Spirit of Christ who was in them** was indicating when He testified beforehand the sufferings of Christ and the glories that would follow. 12 To them it was revealed that, not to themselves, but to us they were ministering the things which now have been reported to you through those who have preached the gospel to you by the Holy Spirit sent from heaventhings which angels desire to look into." - 1 Pet 1:10-12

The Bible claims to be... _____-____.

"From childhood you have been acquainted with the Holy Scriptures, which are able to make you wise for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. 16 **All Scripture is breathed out by God** and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, 17 that the man of God may be complete, equipped for every good work." (2 Tim 3:15-17)

Notice that the Bible claims of itself that _____ its words are the words of God, not just the words of men.

"Therefore the Lord Himself will give you a sign: Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a Son, and shall call His name Immanuel." **(Isa 7:14)**

-> "So all this was done that it might be fulfilled which was spoken by <u>the Lord</u> through the prophet, saying: "BEHOLD, THE VIRGIN SHALL BE WITH CHILD, AND BEAR A SON, AND THEY SHALL CALL HIS NAME IMMANUEL," which is translated, 'God with us." (Matt 1:22-23)

"Therefore a man shall leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and they shall become one flesh." (Gen 2:24)

-> "And He answered and said to them, "Have you not read that He who made them at the beginning 'MADE THEM MALE AND FEMALE,' and said, 'FOR THIS REASON A MAN SHALL LEAVE HIS FATHER AND MOTHER AND BE JOINED TO HIS WIFE, AND THE TWO SHALL BECOME ONE FLESH' ?" THE NEED FOR THE SPIRIT TO APPLY THE WORD

"Now the word is only an instrument; it is not the efficient cause of all this; as a hammer is but an instrument, and a passive one, it can do nothing of itself; it must be taken up and used by a powerful hand, or it can do no execution; what is a hammer without a hand? "Jesus Christ himself provides a most arresting example in this respect. At the very threshold of his public ministry, our Lord, in his dramatic victory over Satan's threefold onslaught, rested his whole defense on the authority of three passages of Scripture. He quoted the Old Testament in support of his teaching to the crowds; he quoted it in his discussions with antagonistic Jews; he quoted it in answer to questions both captious and sincere; he quoted it in instructing the disciples who would have readily accepted his teaching on his own authority; he referred to it in his prayers, when alone in the presence of the Father; he quoted it on the cross, when his sufferings could easily have drawn his attention elsewhere; he quoted it in his resurrection glory, when any limitation, real or alleged, of the days of his flesh was clearly superseded. Whatever may be the differences between the pictures of Jesus drawn by the four Gospels, they certainly agree in their representation of our Lord's attitude toward the Old Testament: one of constant use and of unquestioning endorsement of its authority."

Conclusion: Jesus believed that what Scripture says, God says!

It has been said with truth that the attempt to evade the evidence for our Lord's teaching the God-givenness of Scripture is as futile as a mathematician's attempt to prove that it is theoretically possible to dodge an avalanche. He may satisfy himself that the trajectory of each boulder is calculable and that an agile man could step out of the way of any one of them. Critical ingenuity may satisfy itself that I can, one by one, find ways of disposing of many of Jesus' statements about the Old Testament. But these statements cannot reasonably be considered independently. They form together a great avalanche of cumulative evidence that cannot honestly be evaded.

THE TESTIMONY OF THE APOSTLES

The church was built upon the testimony of the Apostles, so their view of Scripture is also important:

"Now, therefore, you are no longer strangers and foreigners, but fellow citizens with the saints and members of the household of God, having been built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Jesus Christ Himself being the chief cornerstone," **(Eph 2:19-20)** The Apostles were Jewish men who believed that all they had experienced and witnessed was the ______ of the Old Testament Scriptures. That is why they constantly quote the Old Testament in their writings as authoritative:

"Repent therefore and be converted, that your sins may be blotted out, so that times of refreshing may come from the presence of the Lord, 20 and that He may send Jesus Christ, who was preached to you before, 21 whom heaven must receive until the times of restoration of all things, which **God has spoken by the mouth of all His holy prophets** since the world began." (Act 3:19-21)

"Prophecy never came by the will of man, but holy men of God spoke as they were moved by the Holy Spirit." **(2 Pet 1:21)**

The Apostles authenticated each other's writings. For example:

- Peter accepted ______ writings as Scripture (2 Peter 3:15-16: "and consider that the longsuffering of our Lord is salvation—as also our beloved brother Paul, according to the wisdom given to him, has written to you, as also in all his epistles, speaking in them of these things, in which are some things hard to understand, which untaught and unstable people twist to their own destruction, as they do also the rest of the Scriptures.")
- Paul accepted ______ Gospel as Scripture (1 Tim 5:17-18: "Let the elders who rule well be counted worthy of double honor, especially those who labor in the word and doctrine. For <u>the Scripture says</u>, "YOU SHALL NOT MUZZLE AN OX WHILE IT TREADS OUT THE GRAIN," (from Deut 25:4) and, "THE LABORER IS WORTHY OF HIS WAGES (from Luke 10:7)."

"Nobody dies for a fiction, and nobody dies for a hoax. If your goal in writing something was simply to write a novel or to perpetrate a deception, you don't stick to the story once the jig is up and your head is about to come off. The only way you stick to the story under those circumstances is if you really believe that what you wrote actually happened. And that's exactly what we have in the people who wrote the New Testament. Even as they wrote and taught, they knew they could be killed for what they were saying. And yet through all the threats and all the promises, even up to the moment of their own deaths, they kept on saying it. Slice it however you like. These guys were not writing fiction, and they were not lying. They believed what they wrote, and they wanted us to believe it too."

THE MANUSCRIPT EVIDENCE

What New Testament "textual criticism" does is it seeks to establish the authenticity of the copies that we do have by ______ them with one another in order to get as close to the original as possible.

First factor for textual criticism: the ______ of the text.

The ancient Jewish scribes are recognised as being the most _____ and _____ of all ancient copyists.

A single copy would be used for ______ of years.

"Books in general were far more valuable to ancient people than they are to us today and they, therefore, probably kept better care of them than we do. Even now, when we're able to print books every year by the millions, you can walk into just about any used bookstore and find books that are one or two or even three hundred years old. People make their books last! And that was even more the case in ancient times, when literally weeks of labor would go into copying a book. Scholars have learned from looking in old libraries that people regularly used books for 100–150 years before making a new copy and discarding the old. We see one fascinating example of this practice in what we call the Codex Vaticanus, a copy of the New Testament that was originally made in the fourth century but that scribes re-inked in the tenth century so it could continue to be used. Do you see what that means? Codex Vaticanus was still in use six hundred years after it was originally made! Here's the point: when books were regularly kept in use for literally hundreds of years, a gap of forty-five to seventy-five years between the original New Testament documents and our earliest extant (extant means surviving or existent) copies is just not that long. In fact, it's more than a little likely that the originals, penned by the authors themselves, would have been preserved and used to make countless new copies over decades or even centuries before they were lost. Therefore the claim that all we have are "copies of copies of copies" of the originals is far overwrought. Indeed, it's very well within the realm of possibility that we have in our own museums today copies of the originals, full stop."

Second factor for textual criticism: the ______ of the manuscripts.

We have an astonishingly large number of ancient manuscripts and the ______ amongst this multitude of texts is of an astronomically high

level.

Third factor for textual criticism: the ______ of the manuscripts.

"The charge that we cannot know what the originals said is patently and utterly false. The gap between the originals and our earliest extant copies of them is—in the grand scheme of things—not that long at all. And far from diminishing our ability to identify what the originals said, the vast number of existing copies actually allows us to reason out deductively, to a very high degree of historical confidence, what John, Luke, Paul, and the other writers of the New Testament actually wrote." - **Greg Gilbert**, *Why Trust The Bible*

"Since scholars accept as generally trustworthy the writings of the ancient classics, even though the earliest manuscripts were written so long after the original writings and the number of extant manuscripts is in many instances so small, it is clear that the reliability of the text of the New Testament is likewise assured."

_____ prophecy is another dramatic confirmation that the Bible is the word of God.

"I am the LORD, that is My name; And My glory I will not give to another, nor My praise to carved images. Behold, the former things have come to pass, and new things I declare; Before they spring forth I tell you of them...Thus says the LORD, the King of Israel, and his Redeemer, the LORD of hosts: 'I am the First and I am the Last; Besides Me there is no God. And who can proclaim as I do? Then let him declare it and set it in order for Me, since I appointed the ancient people. And the things that are coming and shall come, let them show these to them...Assemble yourselves and come; Draw near together, You who have escaped from the nations. They have no knowledge, who carry the wood of their carved image, and pray to a god that cannot save. Tell and bring forth your case; Yes, let them take counsel together. Who has declared this from ancient time? Who has told it from that time? Have not I, the LORD? And there is no other God besides Me, a just God and a Savior; There is none besides Me...Remember the former things of old, for I am God, and there is no other; I am God, and there is none like Me, declaring the end from the beginning, and from ancient times things that are not yet done, saying, 'My counsel shall stand, and I will do all My pleasure," (Isa 42:8-9; 44:6-7; 45:21; 46:9-10)

"Now I tell you before it comes, that when it does come to pass, you may believe that I am He." (Joh 13:19)

"Known to God from eternity are all His works." (Act 15:18)

THE NEED FOR THE INWARD PERSUASION OF THE HOLY SPIRIT

Despite all of this evidence, we can only come to a personal conviction of the Bible's inspiration — that it is God's own words to us — through an ______ of the Holy Spirit (John 6:44; 10:27; 1 Cor 2:10-14; 2 Cor 3:14-17)

"The church can bear witness to the canon of Scripture, but it cannot inwardly persuade us of its authority. If that were so the voice of the church would have greater force than the voice of God, and the whole state of man's salvation would be dependent on men. What could be more miserable than that?"

Now when the tempter came to Him, he said, "If You are the Son of God, command that these stones become bread." But He answered and said, "**It is written**, 'MAN SHALL NOT LIVE BY BREAD ALONE, BUT BY EVERY WORD THAT PROCEEDS FROM THE MOUTH OF GOD.' (Deut 8:3) " Then the devil took Him up into the holy city, set Him on the pinnacle of the temple, and said to Him, "If You are the Son of God, throw Yourself down. For it is written: 'HE SHALL GIVE HIS ANGELS CHARGE OVER YOU,' and, IN THEIR HANDS THEY SHALL BEAR YOU UP, LEST YOU DASH YOUR FOOT AGAINST A STONE.' (Ps 91) "Jesus said to him, "It is written again, 'YOU SHALL NOT TEMPT THE LORD YOUR GOD.' (Deut 6:16)" Again, the devil took Him up on an exceedingly high mountain, and showed Him all the kingdoms of the world and their glory. And he said to Him, "All these things I will give You if You will fall down and worship me." Then Jesus said to him, "Away with you, Satan! For it is written, 'YOU SHALL WORSHIP THE LORD YOUR GOD, AND HIM ONLY YOU SHALL SERVE.' " Then the devil left Him, and behold, angels came and ministered to Him." (Matt 4:1-11)

The Bible enables us to prevail in ______.

"If You can do anything, have compassion on us and help us." And Jesus answered him, "If you can believe, **all things are possible to him who believes.**" Immediately the father of the child cried out and said with tears, "Lord, I believe; help my unbelief!"

"If any of you lacks wisdom, let him ask of God, who gives to all liberally and without reproach, and it will be given to him. **But let him ask in** *faith*, with no doubting, for he who doubts is like a wave of the sea driven and tossed by the wind. Read **Deuteronomy 17:14-20**. This passage contains God's instructions for how future kings of Israel were to act. How often do you pray? How confident are you that God hears your prayers, and that He will grant you what you are asking? Are your prayers shaped by Scripture in any deliberate way?

1. The ______ context of Gods unfolding plan of redemption.

"I gained a clearer understanding of this Big Story principle on a vacation. Most vacations find our family making the ten-hour drive from Dallas, Texas, to Santa Fe, New Mexico, to spend time with grandparents. We have grown accustomed to the tripcoffee stop in Wichita Falls, lunch in Amarillo, snack in Tucumcari. The scenery on the drive is intermittently spectacular, and the kids know exactly where I will tell them to drop whatever they are doing to enjoy a mandatory "nature moment." My husband is a lover of maps, and his faithful recitation of the topographical changes to the landscape is always a hit: "We're on the southern plains now . . . " "Just entered the Red River Valley" "Here we go up onto the Llano Estacado" "We're dropping into the Mesalands" The fact that he even knows these details has always been a marvel to me. His high school geography teacher should be basking in the glow of a job well done. And mine should be languishing in obscurity: I didn't know the topography because I was never taught the topography. So it wasn't until I had a reason to fly out to Santa Fe that I began to fully appreciate what my husband knew. As we lifted off and turned west, I suddenly realized I was watching the southern plains unfurl beneath me, transected by the Red River Valley, punctuated by the Llano Estacado. I saw the fingers of the Mesalands reaching toward the mountains in the north. I saw from a bird's-eye view the story I had only appreciated in part, and suddenly all the intermittently spectacular moments of the drive fit together into one continuous and stunning landscape. The perspective I gained on that flight forever changed the way I perceived the drive."
