

Redirection Ideas

The goal is to refocus the student and/or get them to stop disruptive behavior - all without interrupting what the class is doing. In each case, don't stop to make a big deal. Instead, continue teaching as you employ these simple redirections, taking only the smallest of breaks to address the student, if needed.

- 1. Walk to the student's desk as you teach. Pause to whisper a quiet reminder, then continue teaching as you walk away.
- 2. Teach your students hand signals for things like quiet, sit down, thank you, yes, no, etc.
- 3. Walk towards the student and stand near them as you teach.
- 4. Give a knowing smile and/or a questioning look.
- 5. Ask the student to help you with something or run a quick errand.
- 6. Pause your lesson mid-sentence and give "the look."

- 7. Ask the student a question that re-engages them. (The goal is not to embarrass them.)
- 8. Whisper quietly, "How can I help?"
- If the student is distracted by something else, walk to their desk and double-tap the item you want them to put away. Give a smile and/or look, all without stopping teaching.
- 10. Ask the student to move to a new location.
