
## Mastery1-10-Archived-Crafty-Stamped-Ticket-transcript



## Digital Scrapbooking Mastery, No. 1 Archiving Lesson 10: Crafty Stamped Ticket Transcript © 2019 Jen White

In lesson ten, we created a crafty stamped ticket. In this video, I'll show you how to archive the layers of that ticket so that you can use it over and over again in your digital designs. This video is being recorded in Photoshop Elements, but the instructions are exactly the same in Adobe Photoshop, unless where noted.

So here in Expert Mode of Photoshop Elements, I have opened the scrapbook page that we ended with in lesson ten and the Crafty Stamped Ticket group is active in the Layers panel. Right click in Windows, or Ctrl click on a Mac, on this group and choose Duplicate Group. In the dialog box, set the Destination Document to New and click OK.

In the new document, you should now just see the little ticket all by itself. In the Layers panel, Right click in Windows, or Ctrl click on the group, and choose Ungroup Layers. At this point, I am to the group that contains the layer mask. Click on the layer mask to make sure that it's active. You'll know it's active if it has a blue line around it. Then Right click in Windows, or Ctrl click on a Mac, and choose Delete Layer Mask. Now you should be able to see the entire ticket on the document.

Right click in Windows, or Ctrl click on a Mac, on the group and choose Ungroup Layers. The ticket layer in the Layers panel contains the drop shadow. In Photoshop, the Layer Style is located in the group. Click and drag that Effects icon to the Trash icon.

Next, holding down the Ctrl key in Windows, or the Cmd key on Mac, click on the shape layer

thumbnail to get a selection outline around the ticket. Then, in the Menu Bar, choose Select > Modify, > Expand. In the dialog box, Expand By 10 px and click OK. Then in the Menu Bar, choose Image > Crop. Then press Ctrl D, Cmd D on a Mac, to deselect.

If you'd rather save your ticket as a landscape object instead of a portrait object, in the Menu Bar, choose Image > Rotate > 90 Degrees Left. Now you're ready to save this image in the folder that you created inside your scrapbook folder. If you'd like to save the layers so that you can edit the lines, or the color, or the pattern, easily. Save it as a layered PSD document. But, you can also just save it as a flat PNG document that can easily just be dragged right onto a scrapbook page.
