

COURSE ORIENTATION AND INTRODUCTION

I. COURSE DESCRIPTION

This is a course designed to give the student an overview of the historical, political, and social contents of the New Testament books. Attention is given to authorship, dates, canonicity, structure, styles and themes with analysis and exposition of key passages and their doctrinal significance.

- A. Be able to demonstrate an understanding and appreciation of the New Testament as a whole, and especially the Gospels and their contents and purposes.
- B. Be able to delineate the general message and purpose of the New Testament, especially the four Gospels.
- C. Be able to state and explain the purpose and content of each Gospel and its author.
- D. Be able to show the unity of the New Testament, its connection with the Old Testament and its place in the development of the New Church.
