- # 3 round Synthetic brush
- 2 " Bamboo Hake brush, mop or other wash brush
- 1 sheet 300 lb. cold press Arches watercolor cut in half. (15x22 for each large painting).
- 1 sheet 140 lb. cold press Arches watercolor paper (for practice)
- Large 1-gallon plastic wash bucket (or large Tupperware container)
- # 2 office pencil or # B art pencil
- Palette covered plastic pallet with shallow wells (I like Richeson pallets)
- Paper towels
- Old terry cloth
- Notebook
- Pencil (2HB is fine)
- · Pebeo Drawing gum or other masking fluid
- Kneaded eraser
- Mr. Clean Magic Eraser (available in the cleaning section of the grocery store, this can also be found online under a generic name "Melamine foam eraser").

• **About color:** whenever possible use professional quality transparent watercolors they have a higher pigment load, less filler and are ground finer giving you the best results.

Beginners: To keep the cost down student sets are fine try to use tubes not pans. Do not expect the same results with student sets as with the professional colors.

Important: I like use Winsor & Newton for these colors, French Ultramarine Blue, Indigo, Burnt Sienna, Perm. Alizarin Crimson, Quinacridone Magenta for specific blends.

Paper: try to use Arches 22x30 watercolor paper and tear it down to size, pad paper reacts differently and student brands will not give you the results you want.

Brushes: before investing into expensive brushes, or ones that don't work as well consider the ones I use. These are available in my workshops and on my website http://shop.birgitoconnor.com/t/brushes

Hake Brush: these have a tendency to loose hair easily, and easy fix is to squirt a little "Super glue liquid" along the edge of the handle and work it in.

- Do not use course content for other teaching purposes, create your own.

- In general do not use any artist's image painting, photo or composition without their permission for reproduction on cards, posters or to sell online etc. this can create potential legal problems and ruin your credibility.
- Having an awareness of copyright law will be to your advantage, you can look for more information online.
