Even complex songs can be broken down to a simple skeleton of just a few chords that you could comfortably play around a campfire with your friends by the end of this week. Six String Secrets will give you the necessary tools to do this by ignoring all the added fluff that many guitarists toil over for years.

Chords of G Major




