Decisiveness Definition

 Synonyms: absolute, assured, certain, conclusive, definitive, influential, intent, resolute

Antonyms: indecision, irresolute, procrastination, questioning, weak

Decisiveness Definition

- Processing information and finalizing difficult decisions
- Preparation is foundational for decisiveness.
- Know your core values and use them to measure your options.
- Choose the option that most closely matches your inner values and you will be happier and less stressed.
- Having a clear conscience, clear values, a clear perspective, and a clear mind (free from distraction) will help you make a sound decision.

Decisiveness: Etymology

- Decisiveness is the ability to cut quickly to the heart of a matter.
- It involves getting immediately to the fundamental issue and making a clear choice.
- o de•ci•sive•ness *n*: 1: the quality or power of settling a dispute, question, doubt, contest, event 2: the ability to conclude or finalize 3: the characteristics of prompt determination

Dependability Definition

 Synonyms: staunch, steady, sturdy, constant, faithful, secure, stable, steadfast, sure, tried-and-true, trusty, unfailing

Dependability Definition

- Good intentions will not make you dependable.
- Think through the process; gather the information, supplies, and expertise needed; and get started.
- Take initiative to work through the difficulties you encounter along the way.

Word Etymology: Dependability

- De- is the Latin prefix meaning "down" or "from."
 Combine this with *pendere*, "to hang," and you have a word picture that illustrates the meaning of *dependable*.
- Dependability is keeping your word so that others can "hang" their plans on your promise.
- De•pen•da•bil•i•ty n 1: quality of that which can be counted upon; able to be leaned upon 2: reliability 3: trustworthiness

 Antonyms: inactivity, lethargy, carelessness, disregard, idleness, laziness, negligence, neglect


Diligence Definition

- Definition: Focusing my effort on the work at hand
- Sometimes the most difficult part of a project is getting started..
- It can be helpful to break your project down into smaller, more manageable steps.
- Create a step-by-step plan to achieve your goal.
- After you have a plan, take that first step.
- Getting a good start builds momentum and gives you energy to make progress

Word Etymology: Diligence

 Diligence descended from the Latin diligere, meaning "to value highly; to love, esteem, prize; to choose." Diligerecombined dis ("apart") and legere ("to pick out, choose"). Thus, diligere referred to choosing one task or object apart from the others.

- Diligence requires putting one's whole effort into a particular task.
- o di•li•gence n 1: steady application of effort to accomplish a task 2: exerting oneself to fulfill what is undertaken without unnecessary delay 3: acting with great care and effort

 Synonyms: control, method, practice, preparation, regulation, cultivation, exercise, self-command


Antonyms: agitation, ignorance, chaos, confusion, disorder, permissiveness

Discipline Definition

- Consider the long-term effects of every decision.
- Recognize that today's wants often lose their ability to satisfy by tomorrow.
- It is not worth losing your job, your family, or your reputation for temporary satisfaction.
- Focus on something greater than your immediate wants, and do what is best in the long-run.

Word Etymology: Discipline

- The word discipline comes from the Latin words discipulus, meaning "pupil" and disciplina, meaning "instruction, knowledge, teaching, learning and military discipline."
- They refer to a specific field of study or developing habits while in the military.
- Dis•ci•pline n 1: training that corrects, molds, or perfects the mental faculties or moral character 2: a rule or system of rules governing conduct or activity

Synonyms: adjustable, ductile, elastic, formative, lithe, stretchable


Antonyms: rigid, resistant, brittle, stern, stiff, unadaptable

Flexibility Definition

- Recognize the new opportunities that changes bring.
- Though these benefits might not immediately appear, changed circumstances can help you find new methods and refine your goals.
- Discern the benefits and opportunities each development brings, and continue to pursue worthwhile purposes.

Word Etymology: Flexibility

- The Latin word *flexibilis* comes from *flexus*, past participle of the verb *flectere*,
 "to bend."
- Flexibility is the strength to flourish amid constant change and pressure. A flexible person accepts new direction even when it means changing personal plans or ideas for the sake of a greater goal.
- flex•i•bil•i•ty *n* 1: the ability to make needed adjustments. 2: the capability of responding to change. 3: a disposition of openness to new instructions. 4: adaptability.







Orderliness Definition

 Synonyms: organization, planning, classification, structure, regulated, neat, tidy

Antonyms: confusion, disorganization, chaotic, sloppy, slovenly

Orderliness Definition

- If you think you are too busy to develop a plan you probably really need one.
- Take time at the beginning of each year, month, week, and day to plan what you need to accomplish. Write down your goals so you can stay on course.

Word Etymology: Orderliness

- Order comes from the Latin word ordo, meaning "row; series." In the late 1500s, the word order was a military term describing the formation of an army.
- The term came into use as a verb when troops were *ordered* into battle formation or *ordered* to carry out a particular task.
- or•der•li•ness *n* 1: the state or quality of being orderly 2: the disposition of things in sequence 3: the harmonious arrangement of objects 4: the observance of law, rule, or discipline

 Synonyms: awareness, care, carefulness, consciousness, meticulousness

Thoroughness Definition

- Planning ahead reduces the number of surprises later.
- Think through each project, including the time it will take, the materials you need, the people involved, and how much it will cost.
- Try to anticipate challenges that may arise and potential roadblocks you may encounter. If you are prepared to deal with these issues, delays and mistakes will be minimal.

Word Etymology: Thoroughness

- About 1,000 A.D., the adjective *thuruh* meant "from side to side; from end to end." The modern derivatives *door* and *thorough* actually come from the same linguistic root referring to a passage or a hole. Thus, thoroughness carried the idea of passing completely through.
- Thoroughoness n 1: the quality of completeness 2: not
 overlooking important details 3: exhaustive in fulfilling a task




