Some Conclusions on Gender Research

My conclusions from the research I have done on gender-segregated small groups are as follows: Pros:

- 1.) Ministry leaders perceive gender segregation as helpful, especially in young adults.
- 2.) It provides opportunity for the cultivation of identity in terms of gender.
- 3.) It provides opportunity for role models and understanding mentors.
- 4.) Gender segregation is helpful in situations where participants are asked to be vulnerable.
- 5.) Removes the distraction of attraction.
- 6.) Boosts overall participation.

Cons:

- 1.) Lack of perspective, "hearing the other side of it."
- 2.) No opportunity to cultivate opposite-sex, Christ-centered relationships.
- 3.) Gender segregation is not always an efficient paradigm, e.g. community service-oriented groups.





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"Which of the following, if any, have you experienced in your church, parish or faith community?"


