

FIRST THINGS FIRST

Principle: Building interpersonal relationships in the right order will result in happier relationships.

I. Relationship to God... (Jn. 17:9-11, 20-21)

 - 3. The support of the body of Christ can get us through hard times.

- IV. Relationship to the world... (Jn. 17:17-20, 21-23)

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A. Your relationship to the world is the ministry God gives you to fulfill.

- C. God's purpose is that we experience oneness with Him and other believers.

Put God First in Trust. "Jesus did not commit himself unto them...for He knew what was in man." John 11:24-25. For Israel to survive successfully in the land, parents had to be permeated by a love for God.

"Now this is the commandment, the statutes and the judgments which the Lord your God has commanded me to teach you, that you might do them in the land where you are going over to possess it, so that you and your son and your grandson might fear the Lord your God, to keep all His statutes and His commandments, which I command you, all the days of your life, and that your days may be prolonged. O Israel, you should listen and be careful to do it, that it may be well with you and that you may multiply greatly, just as the Lord, the God of your fathers, has promised you, in a land flowing with milk and honey.

Hear, O Israel! The Lord is our God, the Lord is one! And you shall love the Lord your God with ail your heart and with all your soul and with all your might." (Deut. 6:1-5)

Parents were to pass down to their children and grandchildren an awesome and healthy fear of God, an attentive ear to His voice, and a life of obedience (vv. 23a).
