Lesson 1: God's Heart for the Nations (Part 1)

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Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. - Jesus, Matthew 28:19-20a

But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth. - Jesus, Acts 1:8

The story of missions begins with the dawn of creation in Genesis 1. God has wanted all peoples on earth, all nations to worship Him and lift up His name.

Many ask: Why do we go to the other side of the world to do missions when the needs are so great right here in Tulsa?

God has a heart for the nations, visible throughout the whole of Scripture.
