

Use the following questions and prompts to help you study, critique, analyze, understand, and write about (or narrate about) the poem you are studying.

- 1. Is there a story in the poem? If so, describe what is happening. Who? What? When? Where? Why?
- 2. Is there a speaker in the poem? Describe him or her.
- 3. If there isn't a story, what topics or themes does the poem display?
- 4. What do you like about this poem? What do you not like about it?
- 5. What is the poet emphasizing?
- 6. Describe how the poem makes you feel. Does it make you feel excited, bored, good, bad, scared, weird, etc.? Why?
- 7. What adjectives or verbs would you use to describe the poem?
- 8. What symmetry or parallelism do you see? What asymmetry do you see?
- 9. Do you see any repetition or words, phrases, or ideas? If so, why do you think the poet included repetition?
- 10. If you were to rewrite this poem, what would you do differently?
- 11. Can you tell something about the poet by reading this poem? What is it?
- 12. If you could ask the poet a question, what would it be?
- 13. Rewrite the poem in your own words.
- 14. What is the form of the poem? Is it very structured? Does it rhyme?
- 15. What imagery do you see in the poem? Symbolism? Metaphors or similes?
- 16. Other things to do with the poem:
