

10 Facts About the NAR Code of Ethics

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- 1. Establishing ethical standards for real estate practitioners was the reason for organizing the national association.
- 2. The Code of Ethics—adopted in 1913—was one of the first codifications of ethical duties adopted by any business group and was modeled on ethical codes of physicians, engineers, and lawyers.
- 3. The Code was the precursor to state license laws.
- 4. The Code embodies the "Golden Rule."
- 5. The Code ensures that consumers are served by requiring REALTORS® to cooperate with each other in furthering clients' best interests.
- 6. The Code demands respect for others' exclusive relationships with clients.
- 7. The Code keeps disputes between members "in the family" by requiring REALTORS® to arbitrate.
- 8. The Code consists of 17 Articles, 71 supporting Standards of Practice, and 131 explanatory case interpretations.
- 9. The Code is enforced at the local level through knowledgeable peer panels.
- 10. The Code is a living document subject to ongoing review to ensure it stays relevant. An updated version appears every January in REALTOR® Magazine.
