Eight Ideas about Painting Expressive Floral Paintings

- 1. Simplify shapes—don't paint petals, paint the overall profile of plants and flowers.
- 2. Paint the "feel" or "spirit" of flowers rather than the details. Let the flowers speak to you and create an emotion that you can express through your paintingc -i.e., -daisies are cheerful, roses are majestic, etc.
- 3. Work from the still life set-up until the painting decides to take over—then let the painting have its voice and forget the set-up.
- 4. Make one flower the star and assign the others as supporting players of various sizes.
- 5. Always use an uneven number of flowers and vary their sizes and the spaces between them. No little "tulip soldiers" marching single file across the page!
- 6. Block in shapes loosely in the beginning with the darkest version of their eventual color. Remember, in expressive painting you can paint with whatever color pleases you.
- 7. Paint flowers larger initially than you intend for them to be since you can cut back into them to create shapes.
- 8. Extend your composition off of three sides to allow the flowers to "breathe" in the painting.
