Pronunciation:

the 5 main differences between French and English

1. Some French sounds are different from English... or don't even exist in English.

(See Module 4)

EXAMPLES:

- The French "R" sound is different from the English "R" (See Module 4.5)
- The French nasals don't exist in English (See Module 4.4)

REMEMBER:

Learning takes time, so **be patient**. **Train your ear with the exercises** provided with the course. Indeed, you first need to **hear the sound** correctly **before you can say it** with confidence!

2. There are no diphthongs in French. French sounds are short.

(Diphthongs are a glide between 2 vowels sounds, such as in the English words day, cow, boat, etc.)

3. Some letters in French combine to form a new sound: you don't pronounce the letters individually. (See Module 3)

Don't let yourself be overwhelmed by all these letter combinations: you will see them all the time and you will quickly become familiar with them.

- 4. The letters D, G, P, S, T, X and Z are generally silent at the end of a French word. (See Module 3.2)
- French uses accents and graphic signs for example the cedilla.
 (See Modules 2.2 and 4.7)

These 'baroque written adornments" are not optional and will affect the pronunciation of words!
