What Is a Template?

- A template is a layered document that provides clipping masks, placeholders, editable text, and more that help you create a digital project faster with less decision-making.
- Around the web, a "template" can come in many different forms. There are templates for greeting cards, scrapbook pages, photo masks, and much more.

Popup Boxes When Opening a Template

When you first open a template, you are likely to encounter at least one popup dialog box.

- The **Update Text** dialog box will pop up if the template was created in a different software program than the one you're using. Click Update. This will not change the appearance of the template.
- The **Missing Font** dialog box will pop up if the font used in the editable type layers is not installed on your computer. Click OK. If you try to edit a type layer that uses an uninstalled font, you will be asked to choose a different font.

How To Duplicate a Template

Templates are intended to be used more than once. For that reason, you should never work on the original of a template. Instead, work on a duplicate. To duplicate a template:

- In the Menu Bar, choose File > Duplicate (PS: Image > Duplicate) and click OK.
- Close the original template without saving.

How To Remove Color In a Template

The colors, or lack of colors, you see in a template are simply designer preference and are usually only for decorative purposes. Some people love having the pretty colors to inspire them, while others would rather not have the colors influence their design decisions. To remove color from a layer in a template:

- In the Layers panel, activate a layer with color.
- Press Shift Ctrl U (Mac: Shift Cmd U).
- Repeat for any other layer with color.

How To Work With Groups In a Template

Grouping in the Layers panel can help you stay organized when working with templates. Some designers include groups in their templates and some do not.

- To expand or collapse a group, in the Layers panel, click on the arrow directly to the left of the group name.
- If you click on the Visibility icon of a group to hide it, all layers within that group will also be hidden.

What Is a Type Layer?

- A type layer will have the Type Tool icon as the thumbnail.
- A type layer is editable.
- Some designers simplify their type layers, making them no longer editable.

How To Edit Text

To edit a type layer:

- In the Layers panel, double click on the thumbnail of the type layer. The type on the document will highlight.
- Enter a new word or words and click the checkmark to commit the change.
- Get the Move tool.
- Press the Arrow keys to move the type back into place.

How To Change a Font

Typically, the fonts used on a template are standard system fonts and are meant to be changed. To change the font of an editable type layer:

- In the Layers panel, click on a type layer to activate it.
- Get the Horizontal Type tool.
- In the Tool Options, open the Font Picker and choose a different font.
- Get the Move tool.
- Press the Arrow keys to move the type back into place.

NOTE: You cannot change the font of a simplified text layer.

What Is a Clipping Mask?

- A clipping mask is any pixel-based or vector-based layer that's meant to have something clipped to it, like a paper or photo.
- The most common forms of clipping masks found on a template are photo clipping masks and paper clipping masks.
- Designers sometimes label these layers for you and sometimes they don't.

How To Clip To a Clipping Mask

To clip a photo or paper to a clipping mask:

- In the Layers panel, click on a clipping mask layer to activate it.
- Open a photo or paper (File > Open).
- Cause the file to float in a window.
 - EL: In the Menu Bar, choose Window > Images > Float in Window.
 - PS: In the Menu Bar, choose Window > Arrange > Float in Window.
- Holding down the Shift key, click and drag the photo or paper onto the template. The Shift key will cause it to land right in the center.
- In the Menu Bar, choose Layer > Create Clipping Mask.

If needed:

- Press Ctrl T (Mac: Cmd T) to get the Transform options.
- On the document, click inside the bounding box to reposition the photo/paper so that it fills the clipping mask. To resize the photo/paper, click and drag on the corner handles of the bounding box. To rotate the photo/paper, hover your cursor near a corner handle of the bounding box until you see a curved, double-headed arrow, then click and drag. Make sure the boundaries of the photo/paper remain outside the boundaries of the clipping mask.
- Click the checkmark to commit the change.

How To Treat Background Layers

Some templates have a locked Background layer and some do not.

- You do not clip papers to a Background layer. Instead, if needed, cover them up with a full-sized paper.
- In the Layers panel, click on the Background layer to activate it.
- Open a paper (File > Open).
- Cause the file to float in a window.
 - EL: In the Menu Bar, choose Window > Images > Float in Window.
 - PS: In the Menu Bar, choose Window > Arrange > Float in Window.
- Holding down the Shift key, click and drag the photo or paper onto the template. The Shift key will cause it to land right in the center.

What Is a Layer Style?

- A layer style is one or more effects applied to a layer or group of layers.
- When a layer style is applied to a layer, you will see an FX icon to the right of the layer.

How To Remove a Layer Style

To remove the entire layer style:

You might want to do this if you want to replace a regular drop shadow with a custom drop shadow.

- In the Layers panel, click and drag the layer style to the Trash icon.

To remove only parts of a layer style:

You might do this if you want to remove the stroke outline, but keep the drop shadow.

- In the Layers panel, double click directly on the layer style (fx icon) you want to change.
- In the dialog box, remove the checkmark beside the effect you want to remove and then click OK.

How To Change a Drop Shadow

Designers typically apply a drop shadow to all layers of their templates that should have shadows. If a layer does not have a drop shadow applied to it, then it's likely not intended to be shadowed. Here's how:

- In the Layers panel, double click directly on the layer style (fx icon) you want to change.
- In the dialog box, click on Drop Shadow to reveal the settings. Change the settings and click OK.

How To Change a Stroke Outline

Some designers apply stroke outline frames to their photo clipping masks in the form of a layer style. Here's how:

- In the Layers panel, double click directly on the layer style (fx icon) you want to change.
- In the dialog box, click on Stroke to reveal the settings. Change the settings and click OK.

How To Replace an Element

- To determine which element corresponds with which layer, in the Layers panel, click on the Visibility icons of the element layers to toggle them on and off.
- In the Layers panel, click on the element layer you'd like to replace.
- Open an element (File > Open).
- Get the Move tool.
- Click and drag the element onto the template and over the element you're replacing.
- To transform the element, press Ctrl T (Mac: Cmd T).
- To resize, click and drag on the corner handles of the bounding box.
- To reposition, click and drag inside the bounding box.
- To rotate, hover your cursor over a corner handle of the bounding box until you see a curved, double-headed arrow, then click and drag.
- Click the checkmark to commit the change.
- In the Layers panel, click on the Visibility icons of the replaced elements layers to hide them.

How To Borrow a Layer Style

- In the Layers panel, hold down the Alt key (Mac: Opt key) and click and drag a copy of an existing layer style to another layer.
- If needed, double click on the duplicate layer style to open the dialog box. Adjust the settings and click OK.

How To Flip a Template Horizontally

- In the Layers panel, click on the Background layer (or bottom-most layer) to activate it.
- If the layer is a Background layer, click on the Lock icon of the Background layer to unlock it.
- Holding down the Shift key, click on the top layer in the Layers panel. Now all layers should be active.
- In the Menu Bar, choose Image > Rotate > Flip Layer Horizontal. (PS: Choose Edit > Transform > Flip Horizontally.)

NOTE: If any of the type layers in the document have a warning icon applied, you will get a dialog box informing you of how the type layer will be rendered. Click OK.

Fix the Type Layers

- In the Layers panel, click on a type layer to activate it all by itself.
- Press Ctrl T (Mac: Cmd T) to get the Transform options.
- On the document, Right click (Mac: Ctrl click) inside the bounding box and choose Flip Layer Horizontal. (PS: Choose Flip Horizontally.)
- To rotate the type, hover your cursor near a corner handle of the bounding box until you see a curved, double-headed arrow, then click and drag to rotate until it's correctly aligned.
- Click the checkmark to commit the change.
- Repeat for all other type layers.

How To Flip a Template Vertically

- In the Layers panel, click on the Background layer (or bottom-most layer) to activate it.
- If the layer is a Background layer, click on the Lock icon of the Background layer to unlock it.
- Holding down the Shift key, click on the top layer in the Layers panel. Now all layers should be active.
- In the Menu Bar, choose Image > Rotate > Flip Layer Vertical. (PS: Choose Edit > Transform > Flip Vertically.)

NOTE: If any of the type layers in the document have a warning icon applied, you will get a dialog box informing you of how the type layer will be rendered. Click OK.

Fix the Type Layers

- In the Layers panel, click on a type layer to activate it all by itself.
- Press Ctrl T (Mac: Cmd T) to get the Transform options.
- On the document, Right click (Mac: Ctrl click) inside the bounding box and choose Flip Layer Vertical. (PS: Choose Flip Vertically.)
- To rotate the type, hover your cursor near a corner handle of the bounding box until you see a curved, double-headed arrow, then click and drag to rotate until it's correctly aligned.
- Click the checkmark to commit the change.
- Repeat for all other type layers.

How To Rotate a Template

- In the Layers panel, click on the Background layer (or bottom-most layer) to activate it.
- If the layer is a Background layer, click on the Lock icon of the Background layer to unlock it.
- Holding down the Shift key, click on the top layer in the Layers panel. Now all layers should be active.
- In the Menu Bar, choose Image > Rotate (PS: Edit > Transform) and choose one of the Rotate options.

NOTE: If any of the type layers in the document have a warning icon applied, you will get a dialog box informing you of how the type layer will be rendered. Click OK.

Fix the Type Layers

- In the Layers panel, click on a type layer to activate it all by itself.
- Press Ctrl T (Mac: Cmd T) to get the Transform options.
- On the document, hover your cursor near a corner handle of the bounding box until you see a curved, double-headed arrow, then click and drag to rotate until it's correctly aligned.
- Click the checkmark to commit the change.
- Repeat for all other type layers.
