

THE INSTRUCTOR Stephen Mansfield, Ph.D.

Stephen Mansfield believes that life ought to be lived passionately, adventurously and on a large scale. His manner of living certainly reflected this philosophy and it has made him the writer, the statesman, and the educator that he is.

Stephen was born in 1958 to a military family and grew up largely in Europe due to his father's work as an intelligence officer in the United States Army. After a youth filled with sports, travel, and mischief, Stephen was recruited to play college football but turned down the opportunity when a religious conversion moved him to attend a Christian college.

After majoring in history and philosophy, he moved to Texas where he pastored a church, earned several master's degrees, hosted a radio show and founded a nationwide network of agencies serving the poor. He moved to Tennessee in 1991 where he again pastored a church, worked extensively in Middle East politics, and completed a doctorate. It was during this time that he also began writing books. His first book on Winston Churchill was a Gold Medallion Award Finalist. He also wrote biographies of Booker T. Washington and George Whitefield as well as a number of other books on history and leadership.

In 2002, Stephen left the pastorate to write and lecture full-time while continuing to exert influence on the American political scene. It was during this time that he wrote *The Faith of George W. Bush*, which spent many weeks on the New York Times bestseller list and has been credited with profoundly shaping public discourse on religion in America.

Stephen is becoming one the nation's most sought after commentators and lecturers on matters of faith, politics, and American culture. He has founded Mansfield Group to answer the pressing needs of leading organizations for education that explains the times and the trends that define the future. He has also founded Chartwell Literary Group, a network of writers, researchers, and artists who help leaders impact culture through books and literature.

His latest books are *The Faith of the American Soldier* and *Benedict XVI: His Life and Mission*. Both have been released to widespread acclaim.

When he is not writing or lecturing, Stephen feeds his addiction to racquetball and a good laugh with friends over something wonderful to eat. His lifestyle is testimony to this maxim: "Live every day as though it were your last, for one day you are sure to be right."

Course Orientation

I. Course Description

History of Christianity in America - Part 1 is designed to impart destiny through the study of history. Looking at history as a tapestry God weaves in time, the course gives an overview of the major events and ideas of American Christian history before the American Revolution: The Reformation, Christopher Columbus, the Pilgrim and Puritan fathers, the Great Awakening and the spiritual conflicts that led to the American Revolution. This course is far from the traditional "dates and dead people" approach to history found in the secular classroom.

II. Course Objectives

This course aims to:

- A. Acquaint students with the history of Christianity in America before the American Revolution.
- B. Foster an awareness of the sovereignty of God through a study of history.

III. Suggested Tools of Study

Introduction

An architect once told me a truth about his field that surprised me and that is easily a parallel to Christian history.

The architect said a house does not really fulfill its original design unless it is first built, it declines, and it is then restored according to its original blueprint. In other words, it is in restoration that the original purpose is fulfilled.

The analogy this provides for Church history is perfect. That the Church lived in relative purity during the first century and then declined until the Reformation is accepted by virtually all Christians. But what has eluded many believers is that since the Reformation, God has been restoring the truth, the power and the glory that was lost from the first century through the Reformation.

For Christians living at this point in time, the pattern of decline and restoration we see in history points to an exciting future. If God will enable us to study the past so as to reveal the future, we will be better equipped to know the times and to know what God's people should do.

While this course is not a systematic treatment of Church history, it is an overview of God's restoring work in history. If it is true, as Ecclesiastes 1:9 - 10 states, that what has been will be again, then what we see in the past will be encountered again in the future. For those who have pledged their lives in the service of the Lamb of God, this preparation for the exciting days of victory that lay ahead will make them more effective tools in the hands of their God.
