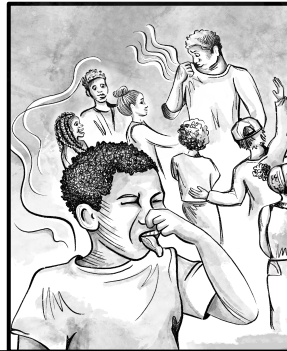
Mystery Stink

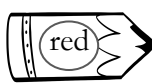
