WHAT IS TRAVEL WRITING?

A travel narrative is the crafted evocation of a journey, usually written in the first person, that is structured as a sequence of anecdotes/scenes, and that presents a quest that illuminates a place and culture...

Here's what you have to do:

- 1. Figure out what the lesson of your travel experience/story is.
- 2. Figure out what steps led you to learn that lesson.
- 3. Recreate those steps in your mind.
- 4. Recreate those steps in words so the reader can live them with you.
- 5. Craft your tale with a beginning, middle and end that shape and convey your lesson.

EXERCISE: CHOOSE YOUR STORY

EXAMPLE

MY STORY START (FREEWRITE)
