

# Using shade cards



In this example I select a palette of **eight shades** by matching J&S yarn shade cards against some flowers picked in my garden. I use a range of criteria for editing my choices down, including:

- ❑ **prioritising the colours in the inspiration source which are of greatest importance to me (in this case there is a quest to get the right shades of blue/purple to describe the luminous Borage blossoms)**
- ❑ **matching the inspiration source continually to the shade cards to keep trying to understand its colours**
- ❑ **tinkering with the palette to ensure I don't end up with a whole range of yarn shades that are too similar in value**

I also reflect on many of the lessons learned from a similar set of shades used in an earlier KNITSONIK swatch and discuss the value of keeping our “mistake” knitting as a valuable learning resource to help us build our skills for colour blending in stranded colourwork.
