How it's spelled:

a: fast, lap, glass, half, dance, snack, pan, pass, jazz, staff, wrap, attach, candy, cancel, pattern, salmon, actual, after, rather, advantage, disaster, example, family

Less common spellings:

ai: plaid

au: laugh

æn or æm feels more nasally

Examples: am, an, sand, ran, plant, advanced, ham, salmon, sandwich

Words that are a in British RP English but æ in American English:
