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HISTORY

Taiyi Riding the Wind Sword is Master Yu Anren's family kungfu. The book, Who's Who in Chinese Martial Arts has the following report:

Yu Anren (1940–), heir of Taiyi Swimming Dragon Chuan, is from Guilin in Guangxi province. His family originated from Pingjiang county in Hunan province.

Yu learned Taiyi Swimming Dragon Chuan techniques and principles, which were only passed to the family members, from his grandfather Yu Shao who used to be the general of the Nationalist. Yu Anren broke the family's tradition when he compiled and donated to the state Taiyi Swimming Dragon Chuan, Taiyi Riding the Wind Sword and other forms of boxing and weaponry from the Taiyi Men sect. When Yu Anren took part in the Changsha Regional Martial Arts Competition in 1984, he performed the Chuan for the first time and won first place for internal style martial arts. Since then, his form has spread quickly and the number of followers has reached several thousands.

Yu Anren was invited to Hong Kong twice to teach his art. In 1988 he took part in the National Martial Arts Exhibition and Exchange Meet in Jinzhou and performed the Swimming Dragon Chuan and some swordsmanship. In 1994, 2015 and 2018 Grandmaster Yu was invited to USA to teach the family forms.

Currently he is preparing materials from the Taiyi Men sect — boxing and weaponry routines—for publication. He was both the coach and a standing member of the Changsha Martial Arts Association and a standing member of the Hunan Martial Arts Association. He has also invented a Calendar of the Body's Vital Rhythms chart which has been patented.

INSTRUCTOR

Dr. Liping Zhu, DAOM, L.Ac., founder of Qi Dragon Healing Center and a gold medalist in the 1996 International Martial Arts Tournament, studied intensively in China with Grandmaster Yu Anren, the lineage holder of his family heirloom Taiyi Swimming Dragon Chuan. She is one of the few disciples of Grandmaster Yu who is teaching outside China.

Dr. Zhu is also a certified instructor of the Heavenly Essence Qigong system and was the Qigong instructor of the American College of Traditional Chinese Medicine for 16 years. Dr. Zhu currently teaches both Taichi and Qigong classes and workshops internationally and has an acupuncture practice in Humboldt, CA.

A Brief Introduction to Taiyi Riding the Wind Sword

Taiyi Riding the Wind Sword, the sister form of Taiyi Swimming Dragon Chuan, is part of Grandmaster Yu Anren's family heirloom.

Grandmaster Yu learned Taiyi sect techniques and principles from his grandfather Yu Shao who was a general of the Nationalist and his grandmother who was a member of the last emperor Pu Yi's family. Originating from the famous Zhongnan Daoist Mountain in China, this form is a very rare, uniquely beautiful and energetic sword style whose technique is of a high level internal quality. Consequently its moves have a certain level of difficulty to fully master. As its name describes, this form is like riding the wind with agility, power, grace and fluidity.




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
