Hello! There are many different ways to make a snowglobe tumbler. Below, I'm providing a list of the supplies I use to make my snowglobe tumblers – with a vegetable glycerin and water liquid mixture. I've included links to the items I purchase and use but feel free to shop around and choose alternatives.

- Double Wall Acrylic Tumbler (I use a mix of the ones listed below)
 - o Let Me Bling double wall tumblers (get your tumblers and glitter here for 15% off by using code: boobear15)
 - o Maars Acrylic Tumblers from Amazon
 - o If you'd like a Starbucks brand tumbler, you can find them at a Starbucks store
- Vegetable Glycerin
 - Raw+Rare Vegetable Glycerin from Amazon: <u>32 oz bottle</u> or <u>1 gallon bottle</u>
 - o Doctors Scientific Organica Vegetable Glycerin from Amazon
- Purified or distilled water I use Kirkland brand drinking water from Costco
- <u>Condiment squeeze bottle</u> or <u>measuring cups</u>
- Glitter (preferably chunky or chunky mixes)
 - Let Me Bling glitter (get your tumblers and glitter here for 15% off by using code: **boobear15**)
 - I also use a lot of the <u>Recollections</u> chunky glitter mixes from Michael's
- A drill or hot-fix rhinestone applicator to make the hole
 - o I use this hot-fix rhinestone applicator from Amazon with the 34ss (or 7mm) concave tip
- <u>UV nail light</u> or <u>UV lamp with clamp</u> (I use this lamp with clamp)
- UV Resin
- Cabinet door bumpers (12.7mm width x 3.5mm height)
 - Some crafters use glue dots, hot glue sticks, or gorilla tape but these door bumpers have worked the best for me in avoiding leaks
- Weeding Tool
- Rubbing Alcohol
- Popsicle sticks or other type of mixing sticks
- Paper towels

The items below are not necessary but optional and helpful:

- Disposable gloves
- Spray bottle for rubbing alcohol
- <u>Silicone cups and mixing sticks</u>
- Gorilla glue dots
