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In many ways, part two of the homework is the whole reason for this class. This is the payoff where you get to just have fun customizing your very own word art templates.

As we just talked about, it's time to practice customizing your hexagon templates. Not only that, but it's a great idea for you to take some time to create a digital project like a scrapbook page or card where you use these customized templates.

Let's recap the homework guidelines before we jump in. Number one, use at least two of the hexagon templates in your project. Number two, use any of the four templates you wish. And number three, if it's been awhile since you watched the customization rules lesson from the paper strip section of this class, it's a good idea to go back and watch it. The same rules apply for any of the paper piece word art templates we've made.

Now that we've covered the homework guidelines, let's take a quick peek at the two hexagon templates I chose to use and how I chose to customize them. As you can see, I chose to customize the two hexagon templates that had a more color block design to them. I felt they complemented each other well. I made good design choices by using solid background papers, an easy to read font, and contrast in colors that make the words very easy to read.

Here is the scrapbook page I made using my two customized hexagon templates. I strategically placed both templates next to the two photos on my layout. They really helped draw the eye to the photos and they help tell the story the page is visually trying to tell. I repeated the hexagon theme throughout the layout because I wanted this to have a very fun and vibrant feel to it. The moment I saw these photos, I cracked up laughing and I knew I had to make a scrapbook page that was more fun and less serious to go with them. Now it's your turn.
