What I'm about to show you is extremely advanced material. This module is going to make you realize how little you know when it comes to soloing. No other online program out there goes into this level of detail. When you can do all of what I'm going to show you in this module, you're going to be on the same level as me.

- We just want to use the theory knowledge we have in our head and apply it to the fretboard and cut down the time it takes to do so. We want to do it as fast as possible
- It all comes back to how well you know the fretboard.
- Improvisors work things out before hand not spontaneously
- Most important things come back to the fundamentals: Being relaxed while you play, having a legato tone, playing with good time.

 - Beginner and intermediate level improvisors start and end lines on beat 1
 - They are unable to play around beat 1
 - Jazz hates beat 1
