This iron-stained sandstone tower was damaged during air raids in World War II and has been repaired and restored since then.



Scene 7:

This is the only surviving fortified entrance to Rye and dates from 1329. In 2015, 25 tonnes of "festering pigeon faeces" was removed from the arch to help maintain the integrity of the structure.
