Preparation for the Celebration of the Sacraments with Persons with Disabilities:

Course Syllabus

Course Objective: This online course is designed as a resource for persons who are preparing children or adults with disabilities to receive the sacraments of initiation (with an additional module devoted to the Sacrament of Reconciliation). Each module will provide written, audio, and video resources to explore the topic, as well as an opportunity for reflection.

Each module will focus on the topic from three perspectives. First, we will consider the sacrament or teaching from the perspective of scripture. Second, we will look at the doctrine and the liturgical practice of the sacrament in the life of the Church. Finally, we will consider practical considerations for preparing someone with a developmental disability to receive the sacrament.

The final assessment will be an opportunity to synthesize everything learned and apply it to a practical, real-world situation.

Pre-Assessment

<u>Module 1 – An Overview of Sacramental Theology</u>

Objective: to examine what sacramental theology is, why a strong understanding of it is essential to catechesis and sacramental preparation, and how it applies to this particular ministry.

- 1. Starting with Scripture with Fr. Charles Samson: Luke 12:22-32 This passage is an exhortation from Jesus to trust that the Father will give us all that we need. At the heart of both sacramental theology and our ministry is the awareness that the sacraments are the means by which God sustains and provides for his people.
- 2. Mini-lecture: "What is Sacramental Theology?" A basic definition of sacramental theology is presented, offering context for why it is so important to understand this theological background for work in this ministry. Mini-lectures are presented by Michele Chronister, author of Handbook for Adaptive Catechesis.

Hillenbrand Books. p. 133-159 (In this chapter, Dr. David Fagerberg breaks down the idea that liturgical theology is a combination of knowledge and praxis. Those who participate in the liturgy are, in a sense, liturgical theologians. "Mrs. Murphy represents the person who speaks the natural language of theology, even though she doesn't know the formalized language of theology...she knows more than she can say." (Fagerberg 134-135) This applies to our work, as many persons with disabilities are liturgical theologians in this sense their praxis matter, even when they cannot verbalize what they know.

Module 2 – The Mystical Body of Christ

Objective: to present the doctrine of the mystical Body of Christ, exploring how the mystical Body of Christ is lived out in the sacraments, and to consider the importance of this adaptive ministry in light of this doctrine.

- 1. Starting with Scripture with Fr. Charles Samson: 1 Corinthians 12: 12-31 This is St. Paul's famous passage about the one Body of Christ, of which we are all members. In it, he not only acknowledges the reality of that deep unity but also the essential nature of each member of the Body of Christ.
- 2. Mini-lecture: "What is the Mystical Body of Christ?" *A brief overview of this theological term, and its significance to sacramental preparation.*
- 3. Workers int the Vineyard podcast: "How Does the Mystical Body of Christ Relate to the Sacramental Life?" *A discussion with Dr. David Fagerberg, liturgical theology professor at the University of Notre Dame*. https://theology.nd.edu/people/david-fagerberg/

Katra, Charleen; Barone, John. p. 1-10 (This chapter both gives a thorough and succinct introduction to the role of persons with disabilities in the Church, but also gives the sort of foundational introduction to the ministry and to the challenges that these learners face that people without a background in special education may not have.)

Objective: Here we will establish the obligation of all parishes and dioceses to provide sacramental preparation and access to those with disabilities. We will also consider why this ministry is important.

- 1. Starting with Scripture with Fr. Charles Samson: Matthew 19: 13-14 In this passage, Jesus exhorts the Apostles to not hinder the children from coming to him, because the Kingdom of Heaven belong to "such as these." Many of those who need sacramental prep are children (with and without disabilities), and some are adults with disabilities (who are not children, but who are often forgotten and undervalued in our society, as children were in Jesus's society), and the scripture reminds us that Jesus desires us not only to welcome them but also to follow the example of their faith.
- 2. Mini-lecture: "Do I need to offer sacramental preparation for persons with disabilities in my parish?" *This lecture establishes why we are obligated to provide access to the sacraments for those with disabilities, as well why the Church needs us to do so because we need all of the members of the baptized.*
- 3. Workers in the Vineyard podcast: "What Families of those with Disabilities Want you to Know about Sacramental Prep" *This interview with Kelly Mantoan, mother of two boys with SMA and founder of the Catholic ministry "Accepting the Gift", explores how the Church can best serve the needs of these children and families.*https://www.acceptingthegift.org/)

Module 4 – The Sacrament of Baptism

Objective: to provide an overview of the Sacrament of Baptism - its scriptural, theological, and liturgical roots – and to offer practical guidance on preparing children and adults with disabilities to receive this Sacrament.

- 1. Starting with Scripture with Fr. Charles Samson: Matthew 28: 19-20 *In this passage, Jesus exhorts the Apostles to go to all the nations, baptizing in the name of the Trinity. He promises to be with them always in this ministry. This commission (and promise!) does not apply just them, but to the Church today, too.*
- 2. Mini-lecture: "Baptism Gateway to the Sacraments" *This lesson will give a brief overview of not only the theology for this sacrament, but also the necessity (as a means to open the door to every other sacrament and an abundance of grace).*
- 3. Workers in the Vineyard podcast: "Baptism Welcoming with Joy the Children of God." This conversation with Meghan Concagh, student of religious studies at Fontbonne University (with a special focus on catechesis for children with disabilities). Meghan will share about the importance of welcoming children and their families into the Church through Baptism, the significance of Baptism in the sacramental journey, and how priests and lay ministers can better minister to these families.

Module 5 – The Sacrament of the Eucharist

Objective: to provide an overview of the Sacrament of the Eucharist - its scriptural, theological, and liturgical roots – and to offer practical guidance on preparing children and adults with disabilities to receive this sacrament.

1. Starting with Scripture with Fr. Charles Samson: John 6: 29-58 This is the heart of the "Bread of Life" discourse. In this, Jesus makes it clear that the Eucharist gives life, in

- particular life to our souls. As we enter into this ministry, it is essential to remember how central to the Catholic faith reception of the Eucharist is.
- 2. Mini-lecture: "The Eucharist the Means of God's Provision" *This lesson will give a brief overview of the theology and significance of the Eucharist as the "bread from heaven" with which God sustains his people.*
- 3. Workers in the Vineyard podcast: "Uniting Our Sacrifice to His On our Active and Hidden Participation in the Eucharist" *This interview with Dr. Lawrence Feingold, professor of theology and philosophy at Kenrick Glennon Seminary, and author of The Eucharist Mystery of Presence, Sacrifice, and Communion, will explore the value not only of access to the Eucharist but also the value of having all members of the Body of Christ uniting their own sacrifice of their lives to his.*https://edvance360.com/eportfolio/kenrick/feingold/

<u>Module 6 – The Sacrament of Confirmation</u>

Objective: to provide an overview of the Sacrament of Confirmation - its scriptural, theological, and liturgical roots – and to offer practical guidance on preparing children and adults with disabilities to receive this sacrament.

- 1. Starting with Scripture: Acts 2: 1-4 This is the story of the descent of the Holy Spirit on Pentecost (the scriptural basis for Confirmation). The story also demonstrates the results of reception of the Holy Spirit a deep strengthening and courage, allowing someone the grace with which to evangelize. Persons with disabilities, baptized and called to be saints, benefit greatly from this sealing of the gift of Holy Spirit.
- 2. Mini-lecture: "Confirmation Not Catholic Graduation" *This lesson provides an overview of the scriptural and theological roots of this sacrament, as well delving into its role as one of the sacraments of initiation.*

3. Workers in the Vineyard podcast: "The Importance of the Sealing of the Gift of the Spirit – How Confirmation Enables Us to Live out the Life of Faith." This interview with Brett Perkins, Assistant Director of Evangelization and Religious Education in Campus Ministry at the University of Notre Dame, will look at the importance and impact on the Sacrament of Confirmation in the life of the Christian. Module 7 – The Sacrament of Reconciliation

Objective: to provide an overview of the Sacrament of Baptism - its scriptural, theological, and liturgical roots – and to offer practical guidance on preparing children and adults with disabilities to receive this sacrament.

1. Starting with Scripture with Fr. Charles Samson: Luke 15:20 This verse is from the story of the Prodigal Son. We are focusing on this particular verse because of what it illustrates – the embrace of God. There are persons with more significant disabilities, whose cognitive abilities are not such that they are capable of intentional sin. However, there are many persons with disabilities who are able to understand the idea of sin, and to choose between right and wrong. If someone is unable to receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation, they are not required to receive it prior to receiving the Eucharist. However, for those who can receive this sacrament, this verse demonstrates the value of it – in Reconciliation, the penitent experiences the embrace of the Father in a unique and beautiful way. If someone we are preparing for the sacraments is able to and desires to receive this sacrament, then we need to offer them the opportunity to do so!

- 2. Mini-lecture: "Reconciliation Is it Necessary?" This lesson will summarize what the Sacrament of Reconciliation is, and also explain that it is not always possible or necessary prior to reception of the Eucharist. **However**, this lesson will also reframe the question from, "Do we have to prepare someone for Confession?" to "Is this an opportunity for grace that we are able to offer/adapt for this individual, so that he/she can experience the embrace of God in this unique way?"
- 3. Workers in the Vineyard podcast: "Not Withholding the Father's Embrace Making Necessary Accommodations" *This interview with Christy Wilkens, Catholic author, speaker, and mom of children with disabilities, will consider the importance of making necessary accommodations so that everyone who is able can receive the sacraments.* (https://christywilkens.com/)

<u>Module 8 – Sacramental Preparation and Vocation</u>

Objective: to place the role of the vocation of the baptized in the context of sacramental preparation. How does this apply, specifically, to the persons with disabilities who we are preparing for the sacraments?

- 1. Starting with Scripture with Fr. Charles Samson: John 20: 11-18 This passage depicts the encounter of Mary Magdalene with the resurrected Christ. What is striking about this encounter is that Mary enters into it weeping and confused, but after encountering Christ, she is strengthened to proclaim the good news of his resurrection. The sacraments are necessary for the living out of vocations (in the general and specific sense) because it is through that encounter with Christ that we are able to become saints, just as this "Apostle to the Apostles" did.
- 2. Mini-lecture: "Sacraments and Vocation How Do They Go Together?" *In this lesson, we will talk about the importance of sacramental preparation from the perspective of*

vocation. Every person is called to sainthood, by virtue of their baptism. The sacraments strengthen the individual and make them grow exponentially in holiness. In our ministry, we are not just trying to "check the boxes" of what is required — we are trying to offer every opportunity to encounter Christ and the life of grace that we can. We don't want to come between Christ and those who he is calling — access to the sacraments allows him to do the work that he longs to do, in uniting the people he is calling to himself.

3. Workers in the Vineyard podcast: "A Daughter's Vocation- A Conversation with Mary Lenaburg." This discussion with Mary Lenaburg – Catholic writer, speaker, and mother of a daughter with disabilities (who passed away several years ago, but continues to impact others), will give a concrete example of everything we have discussed in this course. Mary will tell us about Courtney, in particular about Courtney's experience with the sacraments and her faith life. https://marylenaburg.com/
