# Plot: You Are the Master of Your Story A Story Works Fiction Self-Directed Master Class

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#### **Overview:**

In this 9-week workshop, we will explore plot together from opening to closing scene. As a workshop, you'll develop a new, full-length novel from scratch with guidance every step of the way. Besides the pre-writing work of crafting a plot arc, I will teach you my Storyboarding process that I've used with coaching and editing clients for nearly 10 years. You'll leave the workshop with a dynamic storyboard ready to guide your drafting process without quashing your creative freedom along the way.

Each week, watch a presentation in your virtual classroom, where I will present the unit's lesson, students from the live session and I discuss the readings and homework, then I answer student questions. In the self-directed workshop, you can ask questions in each module by typing them in the comments field below, and I will answer. You can also reach out to me by email.

Reading and writing homework is given each module.

Note the old adage "you get out of it what you put into it" applies to these workshops. In this self-directed course, you get to progress at your own pace. I encourage you to fully engage with all of the materials. Do every assignment. Take every recommended step along the way. Reach out to me when you have questions and join the live calls I offer Story Works Fiction students (See the Library tab at <u>www.storyworksfiction.com</u> and watch your email for announcements.)

I ask that you learn the methods I'm teaching so that you can add these tools to your writer's toolbox, then make them your own. A tool or process that doesn't quite feel like a great fit in your hand today, may be just the thing for your next book project. Or you might learn one of my methods, then make a tweak, an adaptation, and hone it for your own process later. Storycraft is comprised of a teachable set of skills and methods, but ultimately writing is an art form, and every artist can and should do things in the best way for her- or himself.

#### **Required Materials:**

- Ability to download PDF and audio files, and stream videos.
- True Grit by Charles Portis
