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## Supplies List – Addendum

### Paint colors with pigment number (index)

| <input type="checkbox"/> Burnt Sienna (PBr7 <i>or</i> PR102)  | <input type="checkbox"/> Titanium White (PW6)   |
| <input type="checkbox"/> Van Dyke Brown (PBr7 + PB29) – the pigment varies based on brand, from single to multiple pigments.  | <input type="checkbox"/> Yellow Ochre (PY43)  |
| <input type="checkbox"/> Cassel Earth from LUKAS 1862 <sup>1</sup>  | <input type="checkbox"/> Cadmium Yellow Light (PY35)  |
| <input type="checkbox"/> Dioxazine Purple (PV23)  | <input type="checkbox"/> Cadmium Yellow Deep (PY37)   |
| <input type="checkbox"/> Ultramarine Blue (PB29)  | <input type="checkbox"/> Cadmium Red Light (PR108)  |
| <input type="checkbox"/> Cobalt Blue (PB28)   | <input type="checkbox"/> Alizarin Crimson Hue <sup>2</sup> (PR177)  |
| <input type="checkbox"/> Phthalo Blue (PB15:2)  | <input type="checkbox"/> Transparent Earth Red (PR101) – used only for the Underpainting. The “name” varies widely, but the pigment is consistently PR101. You’re looking for a <u>transparent</u> reddish color such Transparent Red Iron Oxide, Transparent Mars Brown, etc. You can also use a transparent Burnt Sienna. |
| <input type="checkbox"/> Sap Green (PY42 + PY129, PG7) – since it’s not a pure pigment, this one varies from brand to brand (I prefer Williamsburg, but other brands work). |   |

<sup>1</sup>I personally prefer the LUKAS 1862 brand of Cassel Earth, which has a unique, purplish cast. If you can’t find this brand, you can mix Van Dyke Brown with a bit of Alizarin Crimson and white to achieve something similar. ([Watch this video for a demo.](#))

<sup>2</sup>Alizarin Crimson Hue is a more lightfast version of the original alizarin crimson. Some brands may call it Permanent Alizarin Crimson.
