# CHANGE AGENTS

Health is a deeply held value in Alberta. And Albertans have a strong desire to improve both their personal health and the province's health-care system. Kathryn Ward looks at how four leaders in health—change agents—are advancing research, understanding and front-line care



# We need to take knowledge into our communities and use it to support children and families

#### NICOLE LETOURNEAU

#### The change agent

Dr. Nicole Letourneau, PhD, is a professor with the University of Calgary's Faculty of Nursing and the Cumming School of Medicine in Pediatrics and Psychiatry. She is the Palix/Alberta Children's Hospital Foundation chair in Parent-Infant Mental Health and director of RESOLVE Alberta. She has published more than 80 articles and contributed to 13 books on child development for health-care professionals, including Scientific Parenting: What Science Reveals, About Parental Influence and more.

#### The change

Early support of children's mental health can help prevent problems throughout life, build resiliency and coping skills and reduce addictions and other harmful influences on health.

"The brain of someone who's been

stressed throughout life functions differently," Letourneau says.

For example, some people haven't learned how they see or react to a situation. This is called limited reflective function. When people have a higher reflective function, they're more sensitive to people's needs and have healthier relationships. They're also better able to support their children's healthy development.

Letourneau's recent study with the Calgary Urban Project Society (CUPS) showed parents with limited reflective function how to tune into babies' thoughts and feelings. Both researchers and CUPS staff saw positive results, including more responsive children and more sensitive parents.

"A child's development is directly related to a strong and sensitive relationship with parents or key caregivers," Letourneau says. "The child's needs must come first whenever possible."

She is also leading a project that focuses on children from homes with violence.

"Women's shelters are now seeing the children of moms who were clients 30 years ago," she says. "Back then, the focus was solely on the mothers. Today we know we need to also help the children."

#### Going further

"We have overwhelming evidence showing the link between the parentchild relationship and lifelong mental health," Letourneau says.

We need to take that knowledge into our communities and use it to support children and families, she adds.

Letourneau's other research is looking at the long-term effects of stress, anxiety and depression before and after birth on parenting and childhood development.

## Action Team on Triadic Attachment and Child Health (ATTACH): A Parental Reflective Function Intervention

- **Background:** Parents suffering from violence, depression and addictions create a toxic stress environment for their children leaving parents unable to respond sensitively to them (Center on the Developing Child, 2010). Secure attachment is also influenced by parental Reflective Function (RF); parents' capacity to understand and thus regulate their own feelings/behaviour toward their child (Shai & Fonagy, 2014). Few RF interventions exist and typically focus on mothers' understanding of their own psychological caregiving representations but do not promote learning RF skills via practice and ignore co-parents (Cassidy, 2011; Suchman 2010).
- **Objectives:** Building on this research we have developed and pilot tested a RF intervention called ATTACH, designed for high-risk mothers and their co-parents, and plan to evaluate the effects of ATTACH pilot studies on mothers' RF and maternal-child interactions.
- **Methods:** The ATTACH project is community-based employing integrated knowledge transfer via partnering with community agencies serving vulnerable families. ATTACH completed two 10-12 week pilot studies (randomized controlled trial & quasi-experiment) with 20 families.
- **Results:** Data are currently being analyzed. Attrition was very low (<5%); several factors explained high retention: (1) developing strong therapeutic alliances between mothers and ATTACH facilitators (2) offering a nurturing environment.
- **Significance:** Understanding associations between parental RF and child development, and determining the effectiveness of programs like the ATTACH, contributes to environments that support healthy child development.
